Secret Gardens Interview – A Very Secret Garden

As you walk past the sandstone walls around Oxton do you ever wonder 'what lies beyond that ancient stone'?

Well, we were lucky enough to be invited through the gates of one of those walls last May when Oxton hosted its first Secret Gardens live event since before lockdown.

James and Jen Fell moved in to their beautiful home with their two girls just months before they opened their garden to 5,000 visitors on that gorgeous spring Secret Gardens day in May 22.

James, originally from Oxton, lived in Nottingham for some years before moving back to his home village with his family around eight years ago.

James knew he wanted a property in the centre of the village with a garden and his dreams came true when he secured Rose Cottage on Rose Mount in December 2021.

Having been to Secret Gardens events in previous years, James was certain he would like to open his





garden at the next event, despite having only recently moved in.

He was allocated a place as a host in March 2022 leaving him just two months to make his garden an attractive space for all those potential visitors.

This feat was made so much easier because the garden already had masses of potential but it was still a fairly significant project – you're a braver man than most James!

The garden sits to the front of the property and is large with rose beds, shrubs and plenty of fruit trees.

There are quirky garden ornaments hidden amongst the trees and shrubs and great places to sit and while away an afternoon or sit and watch the sun go down.

James believes the house actually replaces an original sandstone house which was demolished after suffering irreparable bomb damage during the second world war.

It was built facing the opposite way to the original house hence the unusually larger front garden

and courtyard to the rear.

James describes himself as an amateur gardener, his only experience is helping his Dad and Nan with their gardens and veg patches when he was younger.

James exudes enthusiasm however and his love of gardening is obvious when you meet him.

Getting ideas from garden centre visits and using a 'plant identification app' James, Jen and their girls pulled together an absolutely gorgeous space ready to open on the day and welcomed their public warmly.

After the hard work of the previous two months, Secret Gardens day was a chance for the Fell's to sit back and relax with friends and extended family as people came in and out of the garden throughout the day.

The family put on their party clothes and enjoyed the sunshine with drinks and nibbles. James says it was lovely seeing old and new faces.

People were all the more excited to see this garden because it had never been opened to visitors at



any previous events.

James assured us that he was supported by the Secret Gardens team and especially by the volunteers on the day who made sure visitors kept to paths and stayed in the areas they were meant to be.

The volunteers were also happy to

help with any last minute jobs that needed doing to make sure the gardens were looking their best.

People visit the Secret Gardens of Oxton for all kinds of reasons – some are looking for ideas, others do not have gardens of their own and some just enjoy spending an afternoon in beautiful spaces chatting and soaking up the atmosphere.

They all have different tastes and the gardens in our village, from the smallest courtyard to the largest lawns have something for everyone.

James offered a few words of advice for anyone thinking about hosting their gardens – start as early as you can but most of all, enjoy it!

Planning Report, February 2023

APPH/22/02032 13 TEMPLEMORE ROAD

Proposal: Two Storey Side Extension.

Oxton Society comment: We are happy to support this application provided that the unity of the front facade is maintained.

LBC/22/02019 VILLAGE RD

Proposal: Window replacement - like for like.

Oxton Society comment: This is an application for Listed Building Consent – we welcome the proposed replacement windows and are happy to support the application

Tree planning applications

T/23/00079 52 BIRCH ROAD Application: Lime fell

Oxton Society comment: This is a large and mature tree in front of the property. Its removal would have a significant effect on the tree vista and hence we cannot support the application

CA/23/00088 37 CHRISTCHURCH ROAD

Application: Sycamore and cherry located in front of the house.

2. Ash and olive at rear of property – Prune and shape trees

Oxton Society comment:

The application is not at all specific but the Society would not oppose the application but suggest in the case of the three mature trees that the canopy is raised and that the crowns are reduced no more than 25-30%.

CA/22/02114 27 STORETON ROAD

Application: Fir tree fell, due to potential damage to wall and it is growing at an angle which is of possible concern

Oxton Society comment: This is a mature tree and its removal would have a significant effect on the tree vista. However, we are not in a position to comment on potential danger so hence we would not oppose the application.

LBC/22/01931 16 Village Road

Proposal: Internal alterations.

Oxton Society comment: This is an application for Listed Building Consent for internal alterations. As these proposals are not visible from the public domain we have 'no comment'.



T/23/000012 20 SHREWSBURY ROAD Application: Ash fell.

Oxton Society comment:

This is a large mature tree with multiple trunks. We are not in a position to comment on the presence or otherwise of 'Ash Dieback'. The removal of the tree would have a significant effect on the tree vista.

CA/23/00004 54 WELLINGTON ROAD/GERALD ROAD Application: Fir tree fell.

Oxton Society comment:

It is a mature tree but we are in no position to comment on the significance of the nature of the angle at which the tree is growing.

CA/23/00002 22 ROSE MOUNT Application: Willow tree pollarding.

Oxton Society comment: The Society would not object to the application.

CA/22/02067 5 FAIRCLOUGH LANE

Application 1: Remove Lawson Cypress due to potential danger.

Application 2: Remove holly due to potential danger.

Oxton Society comment:

The Society is not in a position to comment on the potential danger as assessed by a professional. The felling of both trees is unlikely to produce much effect on the tree vista.

T/23/0200

36 CHRISTCHURCH ROAD Application: Trim crown, prune branches, remove dead wood.

Oxton Society comment:

The Society would not oppose the application but would suggest that the crown is lowered no more than 20% and the canopy is raised around the whole of the tree

T/23/00147 2 RATHMORE DRIVE

Application: Fir tree fell due to Wirral Council's notice regarding work to dangerous wall.

Oxton Society comment: In view of the council notice the Society would not raise any objection.



Oxton lights

Switching on the Christmas Lights in November 2022 was another huge success – and it seemed that everyone wanted to join in this community event!

In January the organisers met with some of the local business managers to seek their feedback as we are always looking to improve and involve is many businesses as possible in the panning of this event.

The Oxton Society recognises that the sheer number of people attending needs some careful consideration in future so as to allow free movement around the village.

However, the main plus point from the Society's perspective was the engagement by some of the local businesses putting out stalls to sell their wares – this is what the Society likes to encourage – the success of the businesses means a stable and vibrant village community.

Back in August 2022, the Society decided to provide more funding for the event in November, and our final accounts for the event show that we contributed just over $\pounds 3,000$.

The event itself cost just over $\pounds 6,400$, which included an extension of new lights up to the













far end of the "2016" building on Village Road, the electrical contractor charge, and the charges to close the roads.

During the event we raised money through mulled wine sales, the tombola stall and from the raffle where the prizes were donated from many of the businesses.

We also received cash donations from some of the businesses, all of which we are very grateful for in helping us reduce the overall financial cost on the Society.

Oxton People – the History Group

Regular readers of the Oxton Society Newsletter will be familiar with the History Periodical that is produced by the Oxton History Group.

But what is the History Group and who are its members? We talk to Bob Knowles to find out...

How did you become involved Bob?

In 2009 I knew little or nothing about Oxton history. I had a question to ask about Oxton and was pointed in the direction of John Green the ardent Oxton historian, who had already amassed a considerable collection of articles and maps of the area and was conducting two guided walks.

I went into John's house with a notebook and pencil and came out with several large boxes of articles, maps and pictures... John's collection.

John wished to retire from the role and had been looking for someone to take over. Not much persuasion was needed and in addition to the boxes John gave his good wishes to the new 'Oxton historian' as he staggered out of the door.

Where did the Periodical start?

The first history article appeared on a page in the Newsletter in 2010 and was well enough received, to the extent that the Oxton Society backed the idea of publishing a standalone Periodical, Number 2.

Everyone seemed to like it, and there was a realisation that it was too much for one person, requiring a small team of people to be assembled. So that's what happened. Incidentally we are now up to Periodical No 45.

Who is involved in the History Group?

We were a group of six volunteers who came together to make plans for more periodicals, walks, researches and events. And that is the way it has continued, with some members leaving the group and others joining from time to time.

We now meet every two to three weeks. Our meetings are largely about planning and agreeing who should do what but at the end of each there is the agenda item 'show and tell', which enables us to share our recent 'finds'. In Oxton, we think there is history round every corner waiting to be uncovered, as Oxton has been full of interesting people...not just the rich and successful merchants, but artists, musicians, brave soldiers and seamen, suffragists and suffragettes, police officers, architects and inventors (and a few eccentrics too)

What is your shared interest?

Members of the group are all interested in original research, rather than relying on information written or recorded by others. So we access as many resources as we can. These include family history websites, street directories, old newspaper articles, the Wirral library and archive services, Chester Archives, postcard fairs, and our own noses. Even old gateposts are of interest to us, often all that remains of some once splendid mansion and a house name that can give a clue about the owner's origins.

Some of us have taken up the Guided Walks idea and now we have five walks, going off in various directions. We try to keep them entertaining as well as informative and we frequently pick up jawdropping stories from the participants themselves.

We continue to research and write articles for Periodicals, publish booklets and a hardback collection of the first 25 issues. These are available at the Oxton Bookshop in the Williamson, as is our now considerable Archive of articles and photos. We provide displays for History events and give Talks all over the Wirral on a number of subjects. We also try to answer individual queries from members.

Group members are involved in the Blue Plaque Project, celebrating notable past residents. There are seven Blue Plaques already: Sir Philip Toosey, George Schultz, Cyril Scott (he has 2), Edith Smith (she has 2 as well), Sir Patrick Abercrombie and the Willmer sisters, Jane and Laura. If you don't know who they are and what their achievements were, you could do worse than go Plaque spotting on an amble around the Village or come on one of our walks.

What does the

History Group hope to achieve? We think we are doing the right things as none of us can remember any complaints. Most people value the history we record and many of our readers send us reassuring



complimentary emails. We are delighted when someone points out a small mistake that we have made, because it proves people are actually reading our stuff.

Oxton is a special place. It's hard to imagine any other small urban village accommodating so many interesting characters. We think we are now part of the fabric of Oxton,

complementing the many ways in which the Society

promotes a sense of community and belonging in the area. We are all about telling interesting stories and it's true to say that most human beings enjoy hearing a good story.

Ever wanted to know more about the history of Oxton Village?

Much of what Oxton has to offer is clearly visible but the stories of events and people from history are best told in an entertaining way by an Oxton Society guide.

New businesses: The Library

The Library

A former Oxton restaurant started a new chapter in November when it reopened as a bar called The Library.

Run by Mark and Paula Basnett and their daughter Jessica - the name was inspired by the family's love of books.

Hundreds of classic novels adorn the Rose Mount premises, which patrons are invited to read, and amongst the many plans the family have for the business, one is to host a local book club.

Mark said: "As a family, our favourite afternoons were spent in Linghams in Heswall with our children and are family are avid readers.

"We wanted to create a quiet, personal, welcoming bar with a contemporary edge. We held a successful acoustic music night recently with local musicians which we're looking to continue, and a cheese and wine pairing evening which was a huge success.

"We'd also love to host a book club here so if there are any in Oxton that need a venue then please come and speak to us. We've been open for



four months now and are always looking at ways we can improve and cater for the needs of the local community."

Mark has been managing director of a business support company in Liverpool for 20 years, while Paula is chair of the Wirral Chamber of

Commerce, having previously been the organisation's chief executive.

Jessica, aged 22, achieved a 1:1 Business and Management Degree at Sheffield University and is the driving force behind The Library and the family's other bar in Woodside Ferry, where her Nan, Bernie, who's 78 also helps out.

"We started running a Pausha two years ago and learned a lot so jumped at the chance of taking over the former Thyme restaurant when the owners put it up for sale," said Mark.

"Jessica is really shaping The Library as she has a millennials' view of what people want from bars these days. We've had some amazing feedback from people who've said we've got the theme and atmosphere just right and we offer something different for the village. Feedback like that makes it all worthwhile."

The Library opens 5pm to 10pm on Wednesday and Thursday; 3pm to 11.30pm on Friday and Saturday and 2pm to 8pm on Sunday.



Foodwise, it offers charcuterie and cheese boards and this was inspired by the family's holidays around Italy and visiting family-run bars that offer grazing platters for people to share, although they area also exploring the idea of introducing Afternoon Teas.

All the meats, cheeses, warm breads and wines are sourced from North West suppliers and the Basnett's have already hosted several private parties, such as christenings and birthdays, in the upstairs section which can cater for up to 40 people.

"The best thing about opening in Oxton is the warm welcome we've had," said Mark. "Our customers have been amazing and there is such a gorgeous vibe in here. Residents have been so supportive and we already feel like we're part of the community which is fantastic.

"We opened in time for the Christmas Lights switch-on and we were jam-packed and we can't wait for the Secret Gardens of Oxton event on May 14 and be part of that community event too."

New businesses: Noubalm

An Oxton business owner who is passionate about helping people and believes in a holistic approach to wellbeing has launched a new charitable venture in Borough Road.

Sara Williams, owner and founder of Noubalm in Christchurch Road, opened NouYou in February, and offers free six-week support programmes for people suffering from cancer, mental health
